

Correspondence from Yung Chung asking for "protection from mob" - February 28, 1887

Petition asking for protection from the mob was filed. Motion carried to "exempt from taxation for a period of twenty years, the yards, workshops, round houses of the Canadian Pacific Railway...on the North Side of False Creek". Salary of City Engineer doubled from \$50 per month to \$100. Both roads to New Westminster are "almost impassable."

The Finance Committee met on Friday February 25th 1887 at 7.30.P.M.

The following Report is submitted:

In considering the amount of the Guarantee Bond to be furnished by the City Treasurer we considered it advisable to instruct John Boulton to have clause 9 of section 152 of the City Charter amended by striking out the word "fifteen" and inserting the word "five" instead which action we trust will be approved of

We recommend that the Auditors Report for the year 1886 be adopted and that the City Treasurer be required to furnish guarantee bonds to the amount of \$3500.00 in addition to his present bond.

We have instructed the Board of Works to prepare an estimate of proposed street expenditure such estimates to be submitted to next meeting of Council

The Fire Water and Light Committee met on Saturday February 26th 1887 at 2.30.P.M

The following Report is submitted,

We have advertized [sic] for tenders for the construction of two tanks one near the corner of Oppenheimer Street and Dunlevy Avenue and the other near the corner near the corner [sic] of Granville and Pender Streets which we trust will meet with the approval of Council.

We would recommend that John Clough be appointed lamp lighter at a salary of \$10.00 per month to date from the 1st of March.

We have authorized the purchase of a clock for the fire hall and a bracket lamp to be placed in front of the Engine House

We have read over the scheme of sewerage submitted by the City Engineer and Mr. Mohun, C.E. and would respectfully submit them for consideration of the Council.

We recommend that improvements on Pender, Seymour and Richards Streets be proceeded with forthwith and the City Engineer be instructed to prepare plans and specifications thereof and that tenders be called for at once, payment for said work to be made out of proceeds of general loan.

We would ask the Council for an extension of time for submitting our Report on Street Improvements.

By-Laws.

Loan By-Law read a second time on motion of Alderman D. Oppenheimer seconded by Alderman Hamilton.

Council went into Committee of the Whole on By-Law on motion of Alderman Lefevre with Alderman D. Oppenheimer in the Chair.

In Committee the By-Law was numbered 29 and read over clause by clause after which Committee rose to Report:

A By-Law to fix the polling places, the time and to appoint Deputy Returning Officers for taking vote on Loan By-Law was introduced and read a first time.

By-Law read a second time on motion of Alderman D. Oppenheimer seconded by Alderman Lockerby

The Council went into Committee of the Whole on By-Law with Isaac Oppenheimer in the Chair.

In Committee the By-Law was numbered 30 and read over clause by clause.

The Committee rose to report By-Law as passed in Committee on motion of Alderman Hamilton

By-Law read a 3rd time on motion of Alderman Lefevre seconded by Alderman D. Oppenheimer.

Moved by Alderman Lockerby seconded by Alderman Mannion.

That By-Law No 30 be engrossed signed and sealed by the Mayor and Clerk and a copy sent to the B.C. Gazette for publication.

Carried.

A By-Law appointing a City Auditor and City Solicitor and Police Magistrate was introduced and read a first time.

By-Law read a second time on motion of Alderman Hamilton seconded by Alderman Humphries.

Council went into Committee of the Whole with Alderman Clark in the Chair

In Committee the By-Law was numbered 39 and read over clause by clause.

The Committee rose to report By-Law as passed in Committee.

The By-Law read a third time on motion of Alderman D. Oppenheimer seconded by Alderman Lefevre.

Moved by Alderman Humphries seconded by Isaac Oppenheimer that By-Law No 31 be engrossed signed and sealed by the Mayor and Clerk and a copy sent to the B.C. Gazette for publication.

Carried.

Motions

Moved by Alderman D. Oppenheimer seconded by Alderman Alexander.

Resolved that this Corporation will exempt from taxation for a period of twenty years, the yards, work shops, round houses of the Canadian Pacific Railway provided the whole of said work shops, Round

houses are established and maintained during the whole of said period on the North side of False Creek in the City of Vancouver at some point between Abbott Street produced southerly to False Creek and the present Railway Bridge across said False Creek.

And further be it resolved that a copy of this resolution be forwarded to Harry Abbott Esq for transmission to the directors of said Railway Company.

And be it further resolved that in case said directors agree to accept this proposal and furnish a list of the said yards workshops and round houses to be so established and maintained within this City by said Railway Company that a By-Law in accordance with this resolution be at once prepared be at once [sic] by the City Solicitor

Carried.

Moved by Alderman Humphries seconded by Alderman Sanders.

That the Salary of John P. Lawson the City Engineer be increased from the present sum of \$50.00 per month to the sum of \$100.00 per month, and that By-Law No 2 may be amended in that respect:  
Carried.

Moved by Alderman Lefevre seconded by Alderman D. Oppenheimer

That as the two drive roads between this City and the City of New Westminster are in a very bad state of repair and in an almost impassible [sic] condition and that in consequence the traffic between the two cities is seriously interfered with, the Mayor and Aldermen in Council assembled petition the government to repair these roads without delay and that the City Clerk be authorized to forward a copy of this resolution to our representatives in the Local House and that sufficient sum be put in the estimates to cover this expenditure.

Carried.

Notice of Motion

Alderman Humphries gave notice that he would at the next meeting of Council introduce a motion to have the Salary of the City Clerk and City Assessor increased to \$100.00 and \$75.00 a month respectively

A special meeting of the Council was called for Friday March 4th 1887 at 7.30.P.M. to read Health By-Law.

The Council then adjourned.
