

Vancouver January 21<sup>st</sup> 1901.

The Council met on Monday January 21<sup>st</sup> 1901 at 7.30 P.M.

Present: His Worship, Mayor Jowley and Aldermen Grant, Parke, Kelands, Coon, McPharlan, McLaughan Foreman, Macdonald, Fraser and Wood.

His Worship announced that Her Majesty Queen Victoria ~~had passed away~~ <sup>had passed away</sup> and asked that the Council adjourn out of respect to her memory after transacting only the most urgent business.

Motion.

Moved by Alderman Grant.  
Seconded by " McPharlan  
That the accounts recommended for payment by the Board of Works be paid. Carried

Moved by Alderman McLaughan  
Seconded by " Foreman.  
That the accounts recommended for payment by the Board of Health be paid. Carried

Moved by Alderman Kelands.  
Seconded by " Foreman.  
That the accounts recommended for payment by the Finance Committee be paid. Carried

Introduction of By-Law.

Moved by Alderman Kelands  
Seconded by " Grant.  
That the Rules be suspended to allow of the introduction of a By-Law to provide for the raising of \$160,000 in anticipation of the Revenue of 1901. Carried.

The By-Law was then read a first time

Moved by Alderman Kelands  
Seconded by " Grant.  
That the Rules be suspended to allow of the second reading of the By-Law. Carried.

The By-Law was accordingly read a second time  
The Council went into Committee of the Whole for  
its consideration with the Mayor in the Chair.

The By-Law was read over clause by clause and  
reported to Council as complete

The Rules were again suspended and the By-Law  
read a 3rd time on motion of Alderman Healds  
Seconded by Alderman Foreman.

Moved by Alderman Healds  
Seconded by " Foreman

Whereas it has been learned with deep regret that
